Harvestin' and Plantin'!

Our harvests are continuing as the summer slips away. We are SO excited about our first harvest of melons! This is our first year growing cantaloupe and our first watermelons in a l-o-n-g time. And they tuned out pretty good! Not a bumper crop but it was respectable. They are heading out to *PlumFresh* members this weekend. Mmmmmmm!



We are also getting ready for fall planting. Snow peas and carrots went in this week and beets will be transplanted today. Fields are being prepared for garlic and fall brassicas, and lots of plants have been seeded in the greenhouse. We are trying to stay focused on the future while our current harvest needs demand

our attention. It's always a juggle -- and we try not to drop too many balls (melons?!)

Devon is putting down "tiles" of hay to mulch the paths in the Test Bed as we get ready to plant beets. Cara is wondering why this hay is being wasted!





Jonny and Dan installed landscape fabric on the new bed of Snow Peas to try to keep down the weeds. Weed pressure this year has been intense so we are trying to mulch or put down landscape fabric everywhere we can to save work/time later in the season.

Ray seeded our fall carrots and got them all set with spray irrigation. It is extremely important to keep the seedbed moist for carrots. It's even more important with pelleted carrot seed (which we use) because if there isn't enough moisture, even if the seed tries to emerge it can't break through the clay coating. Result = No carrots
